

They won a competition for this performance and got to perform it on stage at the National Theatre!




<u>Task 1:</u>

Why do you think the poet has use bold lettering for some parts of the words? What do you notice about the rhythm when you read it out loud? What do you think she is trying to make the reader visualise?






Task 2:
