





Why are we talking about this?





Donald Trump's presidency ended last week on 20th January, and **Joe Biden** became the **new President** of the United States of America **(USA)**.


However, in the last few weeks, there have been **lots of events in the news** about the changing of presidents in the USA, including some **dangerous protests**, which led to Donald Trump being **impeached**.

But what exactly does impeached mean, and should it be happening to Trump? This is what you will be discussing today.

A stolen vote?





People in the USA voted for Joe **Biden to become President** in November last year. While Donald Trump had **74 million people** vote for him, Biden had more with 81 million votes!

Since then, Donald Trump has said that the election was "stolen."

A stolen vote?



As you just heard in the video, a few weeks ago **protestors** gathered outside of a **Government building** in America called **The Capitol**.

The protests quickly became violent when people broke into the Capitol Building. Many Government workers had to hide from the protestors, and five people sadly died.





Afterwards, many **people said that the** riots were Trump's fault, because of the things that he said in his speech.

A stolen vote?



After the riots, members of the US Government called **The House of Representatives** said that Donald Trump should be **impeached** because they thought that he **encouraged people to** attack the Capitol Building.



Impeached:

If you are impeached, you are accused of "misconduct" (inappropriate behaviour).






Similar to a court, **Donald Trump will "go on trial"** and another part of the US Government called the **Senate** will decide **if they think he is guilty of encouraging violence or not.**

Did it encourage violence? (10-12 mins)

On the next few slides, you are going to see and hear some of the things that Donald Trump said before the riots at the Capitol Building happened. For each one, your job is to decide: did this encourage violent behaviour from protestors? Use your thumbs to show your answers, but be ready to explain why!

Remember:

You should only look at the evidence, not your opinion of Trump!







"We won this election, and we won it by a landslide."

Landslide: Lots of votes As you saw earlier, **Joe Biden won the election**by more than **6 million votes**.



Yes, this encourages violence.












"We will stop the steal!"

The hashtag #StoptheSteal has been used many times on social media by Trump supporters who think that Joe Biden stole the presidency from Trump.

Yes, this encourages violence.









"We will never give up. We will never concede. It doesn't happen... You don't concede when there's theft involved. Our country has had enough. We will not take it anymore."

Concede:

To let someone have something, especially when you don't want to give it to them.



Yes, this encourages violence.











"If you don't fight ... you're not going to have a country anymore."

Yes, this encourages violence.









"Peacefully and patriotically make your voices heard."

Patriotically:

In a way that shows that you love your country and are proud of it.



Yes, this encourages violence.












"We are going to the Capitol."

The Capitol:

A shortened way of referring to The Capitol Building in Washington DC.

Yes, this encourages violence.










Reflection (1-2 mins)

Why/why not?


Challenge:

For Trump to be found guilty, more than two thirds of the Senate need to vote that he did encourage violence. Count up the votes so far in your class, and find out what would happen if you were the Senate.

Life's an (im)peach!



In **250** years, Donald Trump is the **third president** to ever be **impeached** in the USA.

He has also been impeached before but, like Johnson and Clinton, he was acquitted by the Senate (found "not guilty").

Bill Clinton



Donald Trump



At the trial, members of the US
Government will vote on whether Trump is
guilty. If more than 66 (out of 100) of the
Senate vote yes, he will be found guilty.

If this happens, he will be the first President in history to **face these consequences**.



Life's an (im)peach!



True or false? (3-5 mins)

Take a look at some statements about what happens to a President who is found guilty by the Senate. For each one, vote whether you think it is true or false. Then, click to see if you're right!



False

True



This is **true.** However, because Trump isn't the President anymore, it won't affect him.





This is true, but it is **unlikely.** Even if the Senate find Trump guilty, it would be much harder to prove that he broke the law in the USA.

This is not true. While he might lose some benefits such as free security and travel money, he will not go to prison.






This is **sort-of-true!** If the Senate find him guilty, **they can then have another vote to stop him from becoming President** ever again.

•	Trump used lots of words related to fighting, so in this sense he encouraged it.		Trump specifically said that people should be "peaceful" when making their voices heard.
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
