Down in the coalmine, underneath the ground

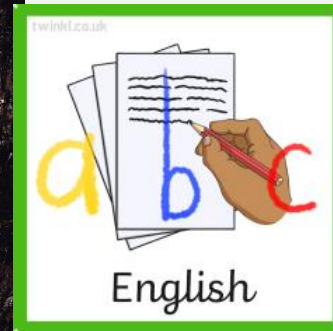
In the morning when we go to toil and down the mine we go
