

<u>Wake and shake</u> - There are many different videos on YouTube for wake and shake or children can follow a Joe Wicks video to get them ready for the day!



There are different rules to remember when you change words to plural.

Today we are going to recap plural nouns and the spelling rules: adding s to nouns to make them plural, if a noun ends in s/sh/ch/x/ss/z you add es, if a noun ends in o you add es etc.

We will also be looking at when we should use **are** and **is**.
